




Part One Key Facts About the State Budget

Most State Revenue Comes From the Personal Income Tax, the Sales & Use Tax, and the Corporation Tax

Estimated General Fund and Special Fund Revenue in the Enacted 2024-25 State Budget = \$288.2 Billion





State Funds Account for Almost Two-Thirds of California's State Budget in 2024-25

The state budget supports a broad range of public services and systems.



The state budget consists of a "package" of bills (budget bills + trailer bills + other bills).



The budget-related bills signed into law in 2024 total thousands of pages.

Longest bill = 900+ pages

Shortest bill = 3 pages



What Are Budget Bills?

- Budget bills provide appropriations.
 - Appropriations are the individual line items in the budget.
 - They authorize a state department or other entity to spend money from a specific fund for a specific purpose.
- In addition, budget bills:
 - Move through the Assembly and Senate budget committees.
 - Are majority-vote bills they can always be passed by a simple majority vote of each house.

Two Kinds of Budget Bills

- Budget Act
 - This is the initial budget bill passed by the Legislature and signed by the governor for the new fiscal year.
- "Budget Bill Junior"
 - This term describes any budget bill that amends the Budget Act, such as by increasing or reducing spending.
 - There's no limit on the number of Budget Bill Juniors that can be included in a budget package.

What Are Trailer Bills?

- Trailer bills:
 - Generally make changes to state law related to the Budget Act.
 - Must contain at least one appropriation *and* be listed in the Budget Act — requirements that directly link trailer bills to the state budget.
- In addition, trailer bills:
 - Move through budget committees (like budget bills).
 - Are organized by major policy areas, like housing and health.
 - Generally can be passed by a simple majority vote.

Key State Budget Deadlines

Deadline for the governor to propose a budget for the upcoming fiscal year (starting July 1).	Deadline for the governor to release a revised budget ("May Revision") for the upcoming fiscal year.	Deadline for the Legislature to pass the initial budget bill for the upcoming fiscal year.	

Legislators face financial penalties if they miss the June 15 deadline.

(Prop. 25 of 2010)

Budget bills and most trailer bills can be passed by a simple majority vote of each house and take effect immediately.

(Prop. 25 of 2010)

A two-thirds (supermajority) vote of each house is needed to approve <u>any</u> tax increase.

(Prop. 26 of 2010)

Three Key Budget Formulas in the State Constitution

- **Prop. 98 (1988):** Guarantees a minimum annual level of funding for K-12 schools and community colleges.
- **Prop. 2 (2014):** Requires some state revenues to be set aside to pay down debts and save money for a rainy day.
- **Prop. 4 (1979, "Gann Limit"):** Caps spending by restricting the growth of certain appropriations from tax proceeds.







Budget subcommittees hold hearings to review the governor's proposals while also crafting their own state spending plans.





Members of the public have many ways to make their voices heard in the budget process.

Key Ways to Make Your Voice Heard

- Submit support or opposition letters
 - Submit letters through the budget committees' online portals: abgt.assembly.ca.gov & sbud.senate.ca.gov.
- Provide public comment at budget subcommittee hearings
 - Every hearing has at least one public comment period.
 - Time limits can be strict there may only be enough time to state your name, organization, and position on an issue ("me too").
- If invited, provide testimony at a budget subcommittee hearing
 - Hearings typically include invited testimony from multiple advocates, providing more time to share advocacy perspectives on key issues.

To influence budget decisions, focus on building relationships with policymakers and their staff.



Timeline at a Glance






12/19 Discussion Results: Budget Equity


